

LETTER FROM EDITORS

Alhamdulillah rabbil aalamiin

There are no words other than expressions of gratitude to Allah SWT, Who has bestowed His grace and guidance upon us, allowing us to complete this June 2024 edition. Just a few days before this edition was published, we received the good news that Khizanah al-Hikmah has maintained its National accreditation ranking in the Sinta 2. This is a matter of great pride for us, as this ranking proved to the public, especially in our field, that Khizanah al-Hikmah continues to be one of the leading journals in the fields of library science, information science, and archival studies and has recently included museums based on feedback from our esteemed colleagues.

The publication process for this June edition was quite time-consuming. This is due to the increasing number of manuscripts submitted to our editorial team, while the number of publications per issue is limited to around 10-15 manuscripts. The large number of submissions indicates the high level of enthusiasm among authors to publish their work in our journal. Moreover, in this June edition, we can confidently say that the manuscripts submitted demonstrate excellent novelty. Therefore, after conducting a survey and consulting with our few respected colleagues, we have then decided to increase the number of published articles to a maximum of 20 per edition starting in 2024. This decision aims to provide opportunities for well-prepared manuscripts to be published in our journal. We also recognize that research findings that are published promptly are far more valuable, and we remain committed to this principle. The eighteen manuscripts published have undergone a rigorous editorial process. Here, we briefly outline them all.

The first manuscript in this June edition informs readers about how hoaxes affect our technological devices. Written by Erni Kurniasih and her colleagues, it explains that education levels play a role in countering hoaxes, with more educated individuals being less likely to spread misleading information. This paper is recommended for policymakers and educators. The second manuscript, authored by Fitri Mutia and her colleagues, measures the performance differences between librarians in Indonesia and Malaysia, concluding that there is no significant difference in performance, competence, and work design between librarians in the two countries. This study will be of interest to librarians and academics in the field, particularly those involved in developing library services.

The next four manuscripts address issues related to digitalization. Rino A. Nugroho and his colleagues discuss the *iBoyolali* digital library, launched in 2017, and its positive impact on the community. Taufiq Natsir's study on the Elfan Bookless Library, a digital library innovation in South Sulawesi, highlights its ability to improve public library services, albeit with some limitations, such as restricted accessibility in certain areas. Labibah Zain and her colleagues examine how digital humanities have become a focus for librarians at Islamic universities despite challenges such as limited IT infrastructure and strategic planning capabilities for developing research libraries. Reza Fauzi and his colleagues explore the millennial generation's behavior and preferences in Indonesian politics, noting that online media is millennials' primary source of political information.

Bibliometric studies are always prominent in our journal. This June edition includes eight bibliometric manuscripts. These studies cover a range of topics, from the role of digital

libraries in public sector organizations by Rino A. Nugroho et al., community acceptance of reusable diapers by Totok Wahyu Abadi, to research trends in ecotourism in Indonesia by Elvis Saloud et al. They use bibliometric analysis tools to explore and visualize literature developments, identify key researchers and institutions, and highlight major themes in their respective fields. Other studies evaluate the efficiency of library and information science journals in Indonesia by Fadli Ansar et al., health education during the COVID-19 pandemic by Yunindyawati, and children's moral education in the digital era by Marhani and An Ras Try Astuti. Additionally, research on visual impairment and blindness by Dwi Ridho Aulianto, and future research trends in corporate governance by Lusi Kurnia et al., provide in-depth insights into the contributions of literature and future research directions in various fields

The remaining three manuscripts evaluate various literacy, technology, and data security aspects. The first study assesses the book collection at the 'Pinjam Pustaka' reading community by Dayu Rifanto et al., evaluating the suitability and diversity of the collection with the needs of its members and providing recommendations for further development. The second study analyzes the trends in technology integration in university museums in Indonesia by Herman Setyawan, revealing opportunities and challenges in using technology to enhance visitor experience and education, despite facing various obstacles. The third study compares data security and user privacy on Instagram and Twitter through a literature review by Arly Maya et al., identifying differences in security policies and practices, as well as the risks faced by users on these social media platforms. These studies offer important insights into how literacy, technology, and data security interact and affect various aspects of modern life.

As usual, I extend my heartfelt thanks to all my editorial colleagues who have dedicated their time to this June edition. Your hard work is greatly appreciated. I also thank the honorable reviewers who provided valuable feedback despite their busy schedules and often requested major revisions for the manuscripts they reviewed. This effort is not easy, but we are driven by the belief that good quality is achieved through diligent work. Once again, thank you for your willingness to be involved in Khizanah al-Hikmah, and may we continue to foster this scholarly relationship in the future. Success to all. *Wassalam*.
